


Transition Year

Although many new ideas and projects were undertaken for this application, it was also about evaluating and improving what we already do in our school. As a result, the school's PE programme has been developed and restructured to incorporate new strands and areas of activity, and we have

made a conscious effort to raise more awareness of achievements that students are accomplishing at local, national, and international levels of sport. As this project has been ongoing since last year, it would take pages of writing to go through every facet of the work the school, staff and students have carried out, however some of the new initiatives and improvements we have made in recent months are:

- Break time circuit exercises with all 1st year students two mornings per week.
- Lunch time walking group with all 1st year students 1-2 afternoons per week.
- Participation of 1st and 2nd year students as well as teachers in the Aviva Health Fitness Challenge.
- Participation of 2nd year girls (Zumba Dancing), 5th and 6th year boys (Boxing), and teachers in two separate Sky Sports - Living for Sport projects.
- Whole-School Participation in a number of 5km Fun Runs.
- Addition of new modules to TY and Senior Cycle PE (e.g. TRX and Fleet Feet classes).
- Planned addition of aquatics to the Junior Cycle PE.
- Professionally mapping the school grounds and laying out orienteering courses.
- Developing links with local sports clubs (e.g. use of facilities in the HWH GAA club, Bunclody Boxing Club, and Bunclody AFC for training and events), links with Sports Active Wexford, use of local sporting celebrities, parents and past-pupils as guest speakers, coaches, etc.




- Improving links with local primary schools GAA coaching by 4th year students with many primary schools from around the area.
- Allowing students to have more responsibility with planning, organising and
- running activities and events (e.g. TY students that assisted teachers with the Walking Club).
- Whole school Healthy Eating initiative was increased from 1 day a week, to 4 days a week.

An Active School Week was successfully run and included guest speakers, PowerPoint/video presentations to form classes, events and activities, etc., all geared towards the ideas of Exercise, Healthy Eating, Fitness, and Well-Being.

These are but a few of the areas that were focused on by the school community, and after a visit from an Active Flag Inspector, we became just the 2nd secondary school in Co. Wexford to be awarded our flag in April this year. This award however is an ongoing process, and as a school community we must maintain our drive towards a more active and healthy school over the next 3 years in order to keep this endorsement as an *Active School*.
